Finding Your Independent Reading Books

Good books are easily accessible; you just need to know what resources to use to find them. Below are some simple ways you can find the "Just Right" book you'd like to read.

Our Classroom Library!

I have all of our classroom books organized by theme, so you can easily find a "type" of book you may be interested in. Check out the bookshelves that are all around the room! Be sure to "check it out" with me before you take the book out of the classroom.

Kenowa Hills High School Media Center Card Catalog:

Our media center has a great selection of both fiction and nonfiction books.

- 1. You can access it here: <u>http://destiny.kentisd.org/</u> (Click Kenowa Hills, then Kenowa Hills High School) or go to the Kenowa Hills High School homepage: <u>http://khhsmc.weebly.com/</u>
- 2. You can do a subject, author, or title search. If you know what topics you like, just do a subject search. For example, type in "baseball" and hit Subject and many titles will pop up.
- 3. Review the book's description by clicking on the title's hyperlink
- 4. Note: If the Call# says FIC--the book is fiction. If the Call # has a number-it is nonfiction
- 5. You can then go to the Media Center and check out the book.

Kent District Libraries (KDL)

Grand Rapids, Walker, and Comstock Park have KDL libraries probably near to where you live. You will just need to pop in or sign up ONLINE (<u>click here</u>) to get a FREE library card that will allow to check out not only books, but movies on DVD, music on CD, and Ebooks.

You can do title searches or use the advanced search to do topic searches--I'll demonstrate how to use this website in class.

Grand Rapids Public Library

This website and app are free and allow you to find books on topics and genres that interest you, keep track of the books you've read, want to read, and are reading. You can "friend" your friends and see what they are reading. You can get summaries of books and write reviews. Click <u>here</u> to sign up.
